Invasive: Medium impact

Species profile

Habitat: Terrestrial. Prefers habitats with dense

undergrowth such as deciduous woodland

and hedgerows.

Distribution in Ireland Common in the southern half of the country.

Status: Established. **Family name:** Cricetidae.

Reproduction: Breeding season from March to April and

September to October. Gestation lasts 19-20 days for first pregnancy with subsequent pregnancies

lasting 19-25 days.

Identifying features

Colour: Chestnut-brown, with the underside of their tail lighter

in colour. Juveniles are grey-brown in colour.

Size: Ranging from 79-117mm.

Tail length: Half the length of the head and body.

Threats

In mainland Europe, bank voles are considered a minor pest in the commercial forestry plantations.

Similar species

• At a quick glance it may be confused with other small rodent species such as mice. However, the bank vole has a blunt nose, shorter tail and more rounded ears.
